OUR GARDENS GROW: NEW RAISED BEDS ARRIVE AT THE BOARDWALK

This season, we were thrilled to collaborate with the **City of North Bay** to design and install three new raised garden beds along the waterfront, a project generously funded by **MacKay Homes**. These new additions brought vibrant bursts of colour to our usual perennial-focused spaces, allowing us to incorporate a beautiful mix of annual plants into the gardens.

Beyond their visual appeal, these raised beds were created with accessibility in mind. They offer a welcoming gardening space for those who may find bending or kneeling difficult, ensuring that everyone has the opportunity to take part in and enjoy the gardens. If you're considering stepping back from traditional gardening but still want to make a meaningful difference at the waterfront, this could be the perfect opportunity. We are always looking for more volunteers to join us and help these gardens flourish, and we would love to hear from you.

We give our thanks to our team of volunteers who planted these flowers back in

June (pictured above). We are also especially grateful to have volunteers Carol and Claire, who volunteered their time to care for these beds throughout the season. Their hard work and dedication helped our new additions thrive, and the results speak for themselves.

SOMETHING NEW IS BLOOMING AT BED 15!



NATIVE SPECIES ARBORETUM AUDIO TOUR



On June 16th, the North Bay Heritage Gardeners celebrated the grand opening of the Native Species Arboretum Audio Tour with an incredible turnout of volunteers, community members, and local leaders. Developed with artist Shanan King thanks to support from Creative Industries, the project transformed an overlooked garden bed into a vibrant learning space featuring native plants for local pollinator. Visitors can explore six QR-coded audio stops, each sharing stories about the plants and restoration work in the space. STAYING SHARP: A TOOL SHARPENING WORKSHOP



On Friday, September 19th, volunteers joined us at the Marathon Beach Gazebo (ACT Picnic Shelter) for a hands-on Sharpening Workshop. Kody Horsfield, owner of Horsfield Knives, demonstrated practical sharpening techniques using a hand file, pocket sharpener, and leather strop, while sharing safety tips and tool care advice. Our Horticultural Coordinator, Lucy Emmott, showed how to oil and properly store tools for winter. The workshop was a huge success, and below are some of the top tips they shared to help keep your tools sharp and ready for seasons to come.

Clean: Remove dirt and rust before sharpening; clean tools make the job easier and prevents damage.

Understand Edge Geometry: Identify the main bevel and micro bevel (the fine cutting edge, about 20°), so you know which part to sharpen.

File: Use a hand file to lightly sharpen the micro bevel, making a few passes to smooth chips; take damaged blades to a professional.

Raise the Burr: Sharpen until a small burr forms on the edge—this means the metal has been worked properly.

Strop: Use a leather strop or belt with wax to remove the burr and polish the edge by running it back and forth along both sides.

Oil: Finish by wiping the blade with DW40, spray oil, or vegetable oil to prevent rust before storing or using again.

Extra Tips:

- Take tools apart (like shears) for a deeper clean and better access to the blade.
- Pocket sharpening kits with different grits and a strop are great for onthe-go touch-ups.
- Never stop halfway! Uneven sharpening causes inconsistent cutting.




